OWL Scotland – National News

Joint seminar held with Slovenian Network of Forest Kindergartens and Schools.

In August Bonnie Maggio , OWL Scotland Manager and Sally York, Education Policy Advisor FCS travelled to Slovenia to contribute to the international seminar – "Nature and Children Know no Bounds."

Pedagogical work in a forest, forest pedagogics, forest kindergartens, implementing the curriculum in natural environments are trends which have been gaining importance. Since 2012, Slovenian kindergartens and schools that have incorporated forest pedagogy into their programmes have been united in the Slovenian Network of Forest Kindergartens and Schools, which is led by the Institute for Forest Pedagogics. Currently, over 100 educational institutions from Slovenia and its neighbouring countries are united in the Network. The ways in which forest pedagogy has been incorporated into the regular programmes of Slovenian kindergartens and schools are diverse and unique, just as our forests and children are. Owing to its own development path, Slovenia is becoming a good practice example in the broader European area. Bonnie and Sally were invited to share their knowledge of practice from Scotland with the 50 teachers who attended the event over 2 days giving keynote speeches and running workshops on Soils, Outdoor Numeracy, Biodiversity for Early years and Outdoor Archaeological Learning.

and Cath Latham, a Social Worker with a keen interest in working with Foster Carers in a therapeutic way in a natural environment.

Consultation on a Forestry Strategy for Scotland

A public consultation on a Forestry Strategy for Scotland was opened on 20 September 2018. It closes on 29th November and responses will be used to inform the content and structure of the final strategy.

The draft strategy for consultation underpins the Scottish Government's ambitions for forestry and has sustainable forest management at its core. It builds on and modernises the approach undertaken in previous forestry strategies, providing a 10-year framework for action to help achieve a 50-year vision for Scotland's woodlands and forests.

Research Document - Outdoor learning: closing the attainment gap in primary schoolchildren in Scotland

This Research Note compares the performances of 71 primary schoolchildren carrying out curricular tasks in outdoor and indoor classroom settings. By observing, recording and analysing how the children performed in group activities taken from the Scottish curriculum, an evaluation could be made of the relative merits of indoor and outdoor learning. In general, the results show that the outdoors environment had a more positive impact on individual and group performance than the indoor classroom. The effect of the outdoor setting on underachieving pupils was particularly notable, improving their engagement, contribution and self-confidence to match that of their peers. The results also indicate that the indoor classroom setting was less motivating, especially for those children with learning difficulties. By contrast, the richness of the outdoor setting provided an equitable learning environment where both younger and older children thrived, not only as a place where they were able to think creatively and work independently, but one where they could also learn how to collaborate and effectively solve problems with others in their groups. Furthermore, it helped them develop an appreciation of their own abilities and the natural world around them. Therefore, increasing the use of outdoor learning through national policy-making will support cognitive and social development in primary schoolchildren, and help close the attainment gap in Scottish education.

Recipe of the Month

Muddy Glue



Not for eating but if you don't like using PVA for outside craft and sticking activities why not try this instead?

3 parts corn flour to 1-part water.

Cook in a pan and allow to cool

Activity of the Month

Natural Paint Brushes You will need: Sticks Interesting pieces of Elastic bands (or string)

Collecting pieces of nature for this activity is half the fun. Go on a walk and see what interesting things you can find. Look for different textures and patterns. Talk about which pieces of nature you think will make good prints.

Attach a piece of nature to each of your sticks using an elastic band (or a piece of string).

To avoid breaking your pieces of nature put the elastic bands onto the sticks first and then slide your pieces of nature into the bands. Make sure the elastic bands aren't too tight. You may need more than one band to keep your nature in place.

Species of the Month

Glow worms / Lampyris noctiluca



The glow worm is not at all worm-like but is a beetle up to 25 mm long. Adult glow worms can't feed, so they live only for 14-21 days.

Only the wingless female glows strongly for a few weeks, to attract the flying males. Once a female glow worm has mated, she turns out her light, lays eggs and dies.

After a few weeks the eggs hatch into larvae, and they remain as larvae for

one or two further summers, feeding on small snails which they paralyse before sucking them empty. The two or three-year gap between a mating and the subsequent appearance of an adult helps to explain why you may find plenty on a site one year, yet few or none the next.

The larvae usually only glow for a few seconds at a time from two small points on the rear underside of their tail segments. They often move around slowly in search of prey, using their tail segments to help themselves along a bit like a caterpillar. Adults glow brightly and continuously from large areas on the final two segments with smaller spots on the final segment. These insects are rarely seen by day The adult female has a completely matt black back with a thin, pale line down the centre. The adult male is smaller and has black wing covers.

Glow-worms have been seen across the UK from May to September, with the peak glowing period in June and July. Often seen in gardens, hedgerows, railway embankments, cliffs, woodland rides, heathland and even valleys in Wales!

The light from glow worms is a form of bioluminescence. It is caused when a molecule called luciferin is oxydised to produce oxyluciferin, with the enzyme luciferase acting as a catalyst in the reaction. Adults do not have the same control over the oxygen supply of many fireflies, which can switch their lights on and off in an instant and take minutes to switch on or off. Larvae, however, have smaller light-emitting organs and can twinkle briefly. Male glow worms have the same ability, but it is rare to see them glow. www.glowworms.org.uk

Plant of the Month

Golden samphire / Inula crithmoides



This attractive plant is a perennial coastal species usually found on cliffs and salt-marsh. It flowers from late July until September. The yellow flowers are about an inch wide, with thick, green, fleshy leaves. The large flower heads have six yellow ray florets which may be up to 15 cm across. The flowers are self-fertile (able to pollinate themselves) and may also be pollinated by bees, flies and beetles. The plant grows to about 12 to 16 inches high. Young leaves can be eaten raw or cooked as a leaf vegetable www.beachguide.wales
